Feedback Obtained

The Feedback analysis so undertaken has been helpful in making a SWOT analysis of our curriculum and institutional attributes. Our responses regarding curriculum design and development are majorly positive and encouraging. While the responses reveal the contemporary nature of our curriculum and reiterate the excellent quality of faculty some constructive suggestions include inclusion of more field visits and further integration of internships in the curriculum. (ii)Formal Student Feedback on Curriculum (Subject Paperwise): The HOD scrutinizes the subject/paper scores based on aforesaid parameters and prepares a stream wise (Commerce/ Arts) and subjectwise (Languages / History/ Economics/ Sociology/ Psychology, etc) Analysis and Action Taken Report (iii)Formal Student Feedback on Credit Courses: Suggestions and Feedback received from all Stakeholders is taken very seriously with plan of action or action initiated. Based on student feedback ,a Credit Course in Research Methodology was introduced in the academic year 201819.A Credit Course on Quantitative Methods and Statistics planned for the BA Economics Special students is being implemented from the next academic year 201920. 7.1.7 - Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five) 1.Garden Manuring Activity: [Engagement Activity] The College Garden Waste Management Project yielded about 800 kgs of manure. Starting at 12 noon on Tuesday, 14th August, 2018, Green Guardians undertook the task of spreading the large and fertile manure yield across the flowerbeds in the college garden. A group of 20 Green Guardians participated in the activity, sorting out litter and helping our college sevaks in the process. The students learnt the value of teamwork. They understood the importance of using organic fertilizers which are locally produced, inexpensive, nonpolluting and effective. 2.Making Newspaper bags for Sanitary Napkin Disposal: [Engagement Activity] The Green Club wholeheartedly supports the Red Dot campaign and acknowledges it as a vital step towards the health and safety of waste management squads across the country. On Thursday, 16th August, 2018, Green Guardians of the college gathered together to innovatively craft 135 newspaper bags/envelopes for the responsible disposal of sanitary napkins. They constructed small envelopes, each emblazoned with the Red Dot. This was considered an ongoing year round activity, where envelopes were made in batches as and when needed by students. The envelopes were made freely available to all students and faculty without hassle. Green Guardians contributed to the creation, possession and distribution of the envelopes in classes and washrooms. They also enthusiastically volunteered to teach their classmates how to make these envelopes for themselves, thereby spreading the message of hygienic waste disposal. 3.Ecofriendly Ganpati Idolmaking Activity [Engagement Activity]							

(Cleanup) Since 16th September, 2018, our College has access to the services of the Glutton Machine , provided by the Adar Poonawala Foundation (affiliated to Serum Institute of India), and in collaboration with Pune Municipal
Corporation. This machine is designed to pick up solid waste like tetrapacks, bottles, paper etc. 5.Green Kitchen Garden Patch: [Engagement Activity] The Kitchen Garden experiment was an initiative of Green Club volunteers. It was confined to a dedicated space for growing organic vegetables, keeping in mind the increasing need to grow chemical and pollutantfree food. The volunteers experimented by growing and nurturing chilly, garlic and tomato plants.
